

# From the Principal's Desk-June, 2012

Dear Parents and Guardians,

It is hard to believe that we are already reaching the end of the year. The 2011-12 school year has been a remarkable one at Oyster River High School. Given that this was my first year as principal of ORHS I would like to use this final Highlighter to thank all of the people who have done so much to make my transition to this new role go so smoothly. I firmly believe that a successful school is based on the sum of its parts. What makes ORHS a great school is the commitment from all of the stakeholders to making us exceptional.

The professional staff at ORHS is amazing. Last year at this time they were faced with working for an interim principal who worked for an interim superintendent. The staff was rightfully concerned about the future of their school. Right from my first staff meeting last June the teachers have recognized the need to pull together in order to make this year successful. I have been impressed time and again at how quickly and professionally ORHS teachers step up to the plate when called upon to make a difference. In many ways we have exceeded all expectations. As a school community ORHS has accomplished a great deal this year. We developed our first "SINI" plan, implemented it and achieved "AYP" all while being recognized as a finalist for The 2012 NH Excellence in Education Awards and being named one of the top schools in New Hampshire by US News and World Report. These are all strong indicators of a job well done by a very dedicated staff. Now that I have been named the permanent principal of ORHS I am looking forward to what we will accomplish in the coming years. Thank you to the dedicated teaching staff of ORHS for making this a great year.

The parent community has been wonderful. First and foremost is the level of parental engagement we have at Oyster River High School. Whenever we have a school event or function parents come to volunteer and to show support. Highlights of this involvement were Open House in the fall, the various sports awards banquets throughout the year, the spring musical performance of "Chicago" and attendance at the "Power of One" exhibition in May. In all cases the parking lot was full and a good time was had by all involved. Having parents actively involved in the school is a strong indicator of school success. I hope the parent community knows how much I appreciate their support and how valuable I think it is to all future school improvement efforts.

The Parent Teacher Organization has been very supportive this year. Our monthly meetings have been very productive. The PTO has hosted forums to encourage community involvement, supported educational causes and been a great sounding board for this first year principal. Some highlights of

the PTO year were hosting public forums to discuss important issues in the school community. In February they sponsored a forum on drug and alcohol issues and the impact on teenagers. In May they sponsored a forum entitled, "The Class of 2012: The Places You'll Go" giving the community an opportunity to hear from a number of graduating seniors about their post high school plans. In addition to hosting forums the PTO has supported community and educational programs. The PTO financial support of guest speaker Michael Thompson and of Jon Bromley's Environmental Science sustainability projects has been greatly appreciated. The PTO is a small but dedicated group who volunteer a great deal of time to help make ORHS a supportive place to learn and teach. Thanks for all of your efforts.

No discussion of a successful school year would be complete without mention of the students. At ORHS the students play a very positive role in helping to create a school culture of excellence. I am amazed on a daily basis by the talent and the passion that our students show for what they do and learn. Our kids are remarkable. They care deeply about their school and are willing to go above and beyond to make a difference. Our Student Senate has been a great example of this throughout the year. These student leaders work hard everyday to promote a positive school culture. The Community Service Club is another example of hundreds of dedicated students willing to volunteer time to make a difference in their community. Thank you to our students for all of your hard work this year.

Finally, the Class of 2012 deserves recognition here. As a class they have worked to set a positive tone throughout the year. It would have been very easy for the seniors to have become disengaged entering the 2011-12 school year given the change in school leadership that took place at the end of last year. It would have been easy for them to have turned their backs on "the guy from the middle school" and made things much more challenging. To the student, the seniors have been nothing but supportive. I have been impressed over and over again at how kind and generous our senior class has been this year. I am not saying we haven't had our challenges but in the end we were all working on the same team and for that I want to say thank you to the Class of 2012. They are a really class act and I wish them all great success in their post high school lives.


